

Heritage Trails on Trishaws

DURATION: 3 HOURS

CAPACITY: Groups of 200 persons

The trishaw is a little peddle-power vehicle that has been around since the days of yore. Decorated with colourful plastic flowers, coloured stickers, blinking lights and music, these are now mainly tourist mobiles and are great for going around Georgetown's narrow inner city streets.



Georgetown is a historic city of contrasts, an exotic blend of old and new, where terracotta roofs and stucco ornamentation stand side by side with

modern glass facades. First on the guided tour is a visit to the historical site of Fort Cornwallis. Following that, along the way to the next stop at Pitt Street, guests will be able to see the amazing sight of a waterfront filled with an assortment of ramshackle wooden houses protruding out into the sea, all balanced precariously on wooden stilts. Next are visits to the Muslim Kapitan Kling Mosque which is the oldest mosque in Penang, the Temple of the Goddess of Mercy and the region's oldest church, St. George's Church. Penang's oldest Hindu temple, the Sri Mariamman Temple is also in the vicinity. Wrapping up the tour is a walk along Cannon Street to see the fantastic depictions of Chinese legends carved on the crescent-shaped gold and red roof of the infamous Khoo Kongsi – the clan house of Chinese who bear the surname "Khoo". Further down the street there are the colonial heritage buildings, the perpetually busy Kuan Yin Teng square, Little India and Dr Sun Yat Sen's Penang Base at Armenian Street.
